MEDIA INFORMATION

2012 Media Guide

The 2012 Southern Connecticut State University Men's Soccer Media Guide is produced as a source of information for the media. Supplementary materials can be obtained either on the Web at www.southernctowls.com or by contacting the athletic communications office.

Working Press Credentials

Press and photograph credentials are issued to members of the working media only. These credentials can be obtained from Michael Kobylanski, associate director of athletics/communications. Passes should be requested no later than 24 hours prior to a contest to ensure space availability.

Media Parking

All members of the media should plan to arrive at least 30 minutes before the opening kickoff to ensure parking availability. There is reserved parking available for members of the media located in close proximity to Jess Dow Field.

Press Box Facilities/Services

The press box at Jess Dow Field is accessible via the press box entryways located at the top of the main grandstand. Per NCAA regulations, only credentialed members of the media, coaches, league officials and designated administrators are allowed into the press area. All members of the working media will be provided with extensive game notes, statistics and rosters approximately 90 minutes before each contest. Statistics will be provided at halftime, while a complete statistical package will be distributed immediately following the contest.

Post-Game Interviews

Interviews with SCSU student-athletes and head coach Tom Lang will take place on the field following a 10-minute cooling-off period. The SCSU locker room is closed to the media for both home and road games. A member of the athletic communications staff can assist you with the interview process. Interviews with opposing players must be arranged with the opposing team's SID. Reporters can file from the press box following the conclusion of competition.

Interview Policies

Interview requests are coordinated through the athletic communications office. Requests must be made at least one day in advance to allow the player/coach to be properly notified. At no time will the player's dormitory telephone number be released to the media. However, if a telephone

interview is necessary, arrangements can be made for the student-athlete to contact that member of the media. The preferred interview time to request head coach Tom Lang is from 9 a.m.-noon during the season.

Practice Coverage

The Southern Connecticut State University men's soccer team practices at set times during the fall semester. All student-athletes and coaches are available for interviews prior to, or following, practice with proper notification to the athletic communications office. Interviews are not granted on game days unless there are extenuating circumstances.

HEAD COACH TOM LANG



TOM LANG
Head Coach
16th Season

The storied tradition of the Southern Connecticut State University men's soccer program has soared to new heights since Tom Lang took over in 1997 as the third head coach in Southern Connecticut history.

The Owls have maintained their status as one of the top collegiate programs in the nation, regardless of level. In addition, the program remains the benchmark for all Division II squads to emulate.

Over the course of the past 15 years, the Owls have registered a 220-48-38 mark under Lang.

The program has qualified for the NCAA Tournament on 11 occasions during that stretch, including back-to-back National Championships in 1998 and 1999.

Furthermore, the Owls have posted a winning record and have notched at least 10 wins in all but two campaigns over that stretch.

Lang has guided the Owls to three 20-plus win seasons and nine 15-plus win seasons over that same period.

On an individual front, Lang has also coached two NSCAA National Players of the Year (G. Jean Baptiste, 1998 and Assaf Dagai, 1999), 22 NSCAA All-Americans and five Senior Bowl participants.

One of the most respected in the profession, Lang was honored in 1998 and 1999 by the National Soccer Coaches Association of America (NSCAA) as the Division II Coach of the Year.

Southern Connecticut closed the 2011 season with an 8-8-1 mark and was nationally ranked as high as No. 12 during the course of the year. The Owls also qualified for the Northeast-10 Tournament. Two Owls were named All-Conference, with Paul Templeton earning Academic All-America honors and both Templeton and Yoni Feldman collecting Academic All-District honors.

The Owls posted a 14-2-4 campaign in 2010, one in which they reached the semifinals of the Northeast-10 Conference Tournament. Lang's squad also qualified for the NCAA Tournament for the 32nd time in program history. Nine student-athletes earned All-Conference honors at the conclusion of the year. Two Owls were named All-Region,

with five also earning All-ECAC accolades.

SCSU capped off the 2009 season with a 14-5-2 mark. The Owls made it to the Northeast-10 Conference finals and qualified again for the NCAA Tournament.

Several individual student-athletes were recognized for their outstanding play in 2009, including seven All-Conference honorees, four All-Region selections, with two given All-ECAC accolades.

The Owls completed the 2007 season with a 14-2-5 mark and claimed the Northeast-10 Conference Championship for the first time in school history.

In Lang's first season with the Owls (1997), SCSU reached the semifinals of the NCAA Tournament.

However, they followed that campaign up with back-to-back NCAA championships in 1998 and 1999, extending the Owls' string to six national titles since 1987, a Division II record for most championships.

A veteran of more than three decades of coaching at the collegiate level, Lang had already compiled an impressive resume before arriving in New Haven.

He spent seven seasons prior to taking over the Owls as the head men's coach at Fairleigh Dickinson University. His FDU teams reached the Northeast Conference (NEC) championship game in 1990 and 1992.

COACHING STAFF

Lang earned his first head coaching position at Hofstra University in 1982. While guiding the men's program, his Flying Dutchmen had winning records each year and captured the 1985 East Coast Conference title.

A 1981 graduate of Adelphi, Lang returned to his alma mater as head women's coach in 1987 and, in three seasons, established one of the top programs in the nation. His 1989 team reached the NCAA national semifinals.

Lang was a forward and three-year captain for the Panthers. He played on four straight NCAA tournament teams, including the 1974 Division II National Championship team. He is believed to be the only person to have won a Division II title as both a player and a head coach.

Lang was also playing at Adelphi when the Panthers moved from NCAA Division II to Division I and earned a tournament berth in their first season, 1976.

He went on to play professionally in the North American Soccer League (NASL) with the New York Cosmos, Atlanta Chiefs and Caribous of Colorado. Lang gained his start in coaching as an assistant with Adelphi.

Lang also coached the Lynbrook (N.Y.) over-30 men's team (1984 U.S. federation champion) and served as an Olympic Development Program (ODP) coach.

Lang also has additional experience as an assistant coach with the United States U-18 National Team and as a scout with U.S. Soccer.

Inducted into the Adelphi Athletic Hall of Fame in 1994, Lang currently resides in Wallingford, Conn. with his wife, Doreen, and daughters, Megan, a SCSU graduate, and Kelly.



DAVID KELLY

David Kelly is in his second season as an assistant coach with the SCSU men's soccer program.

In all, Kelly has amassed more than a decade's worth of collegiate coaching experience and also serves as the head coach of the CFC Azul soccer club. Prior to joining the Owls, Kelly spent six years as an assistant coach at the University of Hartford.

Kelly is also a staff instructor for the Connecticut State Coaching Education Program. He was also a former head coach with the Olympic Development Program.

At Quinnipiac, Kelly was an assistant coach with the women's team for the 2004 season. In that time the Bobcats qualified for the Northeast Conference Tournament, where they fell in the semifinal round. In his three seasons (2001-03) at Trinity College, the Bantams qualified for the NESCAC Championship twice (2002 and 2003).

Kelly played 10 years of professional soccer. He spent nine years in the A-League (now the USL Division I) Professional Soccer League and one in the National Professional Soccer League, while also making reserve appearances for both Carlisle United and Burnley in England. During his time in the A-League, Kelly was also a player-assistant coach with the Connecticut Wolves under Dan Gaspar.

Kelly played at the University of Maine from 1986-90 and received a Bachelor of Arts degree in history in 1990. He holds "A," "Pro-B" and "National Youth" coaching licenses from the United States Soccer Federation and the "Advanced National Diploma" from the National Soccer Coaches Association of America.

Kelly lives in West Hartford with his wife Trish and daughters, Áine and Isla.

Former Owl Tom Mattera is in his first season as an assistant coach with the program.

Mattera rejoins the Owls after two seasons on the staff at the University of New Haven.

He has also gained additional experience with the Connecticut ODP State coaching staff and an assistant coach for the Norwalk U19 and U17 boys teams. Mattera has his USSF National D License as well as his USSF National Youth License.

As a student-athlete, Mattera was a part of two NCAA Tournament squads, including the 2006 team that reached the national quarterfinals and the 2007 side that won the Northeast-10 Conference Tournament.

2012 SEASON OUTLOOK

The Southern Connecticut State University men's soccer team will look to mesh together a group of talented newcomers with a core of veterans and thrive during the 2012 season. The Owls are in search of their 33rd NCAA tournament berth in school history this fall.

In 2011, the Owls were ranked as high as No. 12 in the nation and made the Northeast-10 Conference Tournament.

Goalkeepers

The Owls will have one newcomer and one returner competing for time in goal this year. Sophomore Stephen Sasso appeared in one game last season.

Greg Cumpstone, a graduate student, joins the Owls after three years as a starter at Hofstra University. His 16 career shutouts were second on the school's career chart.

Defense

The Owls return three returning defenders and have added four newcomers for the 2012 season. Senior Francisco Lara played in all 17 games for the Owls last year and tallied a career-high eight points (three goals, two assists).

Junior Eric Rothbart and sophomore Danny Quintero saw time as reserves a year ago and will look to make an increased contribution this fall.

Newcomers to the defensive unit include Luke Cantin, Matthew Gilmore, Melvin Lamberty and Alexander Zorrilla.

Midfield

The Owls return four midfielders for the 2012 campaign and have added five newcomers.

Seniors Mario Costa and Luke Perry will look to provide a veteran presence. Costa and Perry both saw action in all 17 games last season. Perry also posted 11 points (four goals, three assists) in his first season with the club.

Redshirt junior Ross McGibney returns to action for the Owls this fall after missing all of last year. He was an All-Conference and All-ECAC pick as a sophomore.

Redshirt freshman Tyler Naef and newcomers Josh Abromaitis, Nils Fussen, Jonas Folstad, Steve Smith and Josh Gustafson will look to contribute as well this fall.



Seniors Mario Costa, Luke Perry, Julian Myers-Antiaye and Francisco Lara are all expected to be key contributors for the Owls this fall.

Forwards

A mix of veterans and newcomers will comprise the front line for the Owls this year. Senior Julian Myers-Antiaye appeared in 12 games last season, while junior Ariel Lobo took part in 11 games and had two points. Classmate Doural Scott was selected to the NE-10 All-Rookie Team in 2010 and scored seven points (three goals, one assist) a season ago.

Joining the forwards will be Nils Fussen, Mario DiMiceli and Daquan King.

RETIRED NUMBERS/NATIONAL TEAM PLAYERS

Brian Bliss

The first player in the history of Southern Connecticut State University to have his number retired, Brian Bliss epitomizes the Owls' soccer program.

A two-time ISAA Division II All-America selection for the Owls in 1985 and 1986, Bliss was a four-year starter for coach Bob Dikranian. He was a three-time captain as the Owls compiled a 60-14-8 record and appeared in three NCAA Division II tournaments.

A member of the United States National and World Cup team which competed in the 1990 World Cup competition in Italy, Bliss was also a member of the U.S. team in 1995 in the Copa America tournament and the U.S. Cup tournament.

He represented Southern and the U.S. in the 1986 and 1987 World University Games and at the 1988 Olympic Games in Seoul, Korea.

Bliss made further history for Southern when he was the first player selected in the 1987 Major Indoor Soccer League draft, taken by the Cleveland Force. The Most Valuable Player in the 1987 MISL annual All-America Classic, he played professionally in Germany's second division with the Carl Zeiss Jena Club; and with the Columbus Crew, New York/New Jersey Metro Stars and Kansas City Wizards of Major League Soccer.

Formerly the head coach with Kansas City of MLS, he is now the Technical Director for the Columbus Crew of Major League Soccer.



Bo Oshoniyi

The consummate goalkeeper, Bo Oshoniyi led Southern to an .860 winning percentage and two NCAA titles in his four seasons.

He capped off his career as the recipient of the Golden Boot Award as the nation's outstanding collegiate goalkeeper, the first Division II player in history to earn the award.

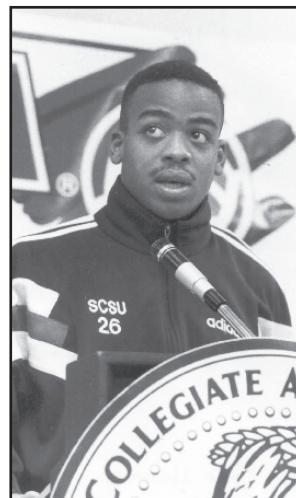
The Poughkeepsie, N.Y., resident tied a national collegiate record with 50 shutouts in his four seasons and a goals against average of just 0.47.

Oshoniyi was a two-time NSCAA First-Team Division II All-America selection and a two-time New England Collegiate Conference player of the year. He started 79 straight games at Southern, allowing only 40 goals in 84 games.

He played in 1993 with the United States National "B" team and competed with the U.S. World University Games team at Buffalo.

Oshoniyi, a member of the 1995 U.S. Cup team, played with Kansas City and Columbus of Major League Soccer.

Oshoniyi is currently an assistant coach at Penn State University and also serves as a scout for U.S. Soccer.

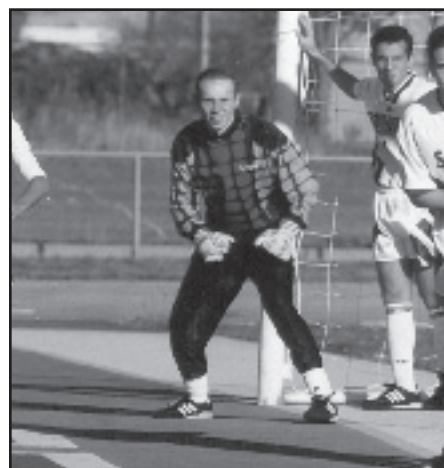

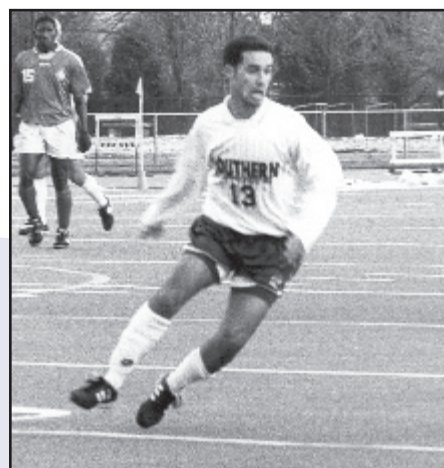

NORTHEAST-10 CONFERENCE

The Northeast-10 Conference is an NCAA Division II conference that was established in 1979. The NE-10 consists of 16 member institutions that are located throughout the Northeast including Connecticut, Massachusetts, New Hampshire, New York and Vermont.

The institutions that make up the Northeast-10 are Adelphi University (Garden City, N.Y.), American International College (Springfield, Mass.), Assumption College (Worcester, Mass.), Bentley University (Waltham, Mass.), Franklin Pierce University (Rindge, N.H.), Le Moyne College (Syracuse, N.Y.), University of Massachusetts Lowell (Lowell, Mass.), Merrimack College (North Andover, Mass.), University of New Haven (West Haven, Conn.), Pace University (Pleasantville, N.Y.), Saint Anselm College (Manchester, N.H.), Saint Michael's College (Colchester, Vt.), College of Saint Rose (Albany, N.Y.), Southern Connecticut State University (New Haven, Conn.), Southern New Hampshire University (Manchester, N.H.), and Stonehill College (Easton, Mass.).

The 16 member institutions are spread geographically from Syracuse, New York to Boston, Massachusetts and from Burlington, Vermont to Long Island, New York. Many of the members are located in or around the metropolitan areas of Albany, Boston, New Haven, Worcester, and New York.

The Conference most recently welcomed the University of New Haven in 2008 and Adelphi University in 2009,

adding to the powerful union of strong academic and athletic colleges and universities.

The Northeast-10 has evolved into a membership committed to competitive athletics programs that emphasize the education on and off the field of its more than 5,500 student athletes.

Counted among the many accomplishments of our institutions are NCAA Division II National Championships in women's basketball, field hockey, men's lacrosse, women's lacrosse, men's soccer, women's track & field, and men's and women's swimming & diving.

From the field of play to the class room, the Northeast-10 honored a number of student-athletes for their academic accomplishments. The conference honored close to 200 student-athletes throughout the year that excelled at a high level on the field and in the classroom as members of the academic all conference teams. Additionally, 2,917 student-athletes representing each of the sixteen schools earned a 3.0 GPA or higher and were named to the Commissioner's Honor Roll last year.

Today's Northeast-10 Conference remains focused on complementing the academic integrity and missions of the member institutions with a commitment to a broad-based championship program, as evidenced by the 23 sports the Conference offers in championship play, the most of any Division II conference.

PATRICIA NICOL

Director of Athletics



The architect behind one of the top Division II athletic departments in the nation, Patricia Nicol is now in her ninth year as Director of Athletics and 14th overall as an athletic administrator at Southern Connecticut State University. A 2010 nominee for the Division II Athletic Director of the Year award and a 2011 selection to the National Register's

'Who's Who Among Business and Professional Achievers', she leads a department that is comprised of nearly 80 coaches, administrators and staff members.

Since her appointment in April, 2005, the Owls have excelled on the playing fields, in the classroom and in the community, maintaining a status for those around the nation to emulate.

Over the course of the past nine years, SCSU has won one team NCAA Division II championship (women's basketball in 2007) and eight individual NCAA Division II championships. Southern Connecticut's teams have made 77 NCAA Championships appearances and produced a total of 179 All-Americans during her tenure.

As a department, the Owls have ranked among the top-20 percent among all institutions in each of the past six years in the Learfield Sports Division II Directors' Cup, including four top-15 percent finishes and two top-10 percent finishes over that same stretch.

However, success has stretched far beyond the realm of athletic competition. The department has had nearly 1,200 selections to the Northeast-10 Commissioners Honor Roll over the past five years. Under Nicol's guidance, the department initiated its inaugural National Student-Athlete Day celebration in April, 2009 and has recognized more than 500 student-athletes since the event's inception.

In addition, the overall graduation rate of SCSU student-athletes continues to exceed that of the general student population.

Southern Connecticut's student-athletes, coaches and staff also continue to impact the campus and local communities under the guidance of Nicol. The creation of the Community Service Cup in 2008-09 enhanced the volunteer efforts of all athletic department representatives. Southern Connecticut student-athletes have volunteered more than 11,000 hours of their time to numerous outreach efforts over the last five years.

Success in all facets remained at the forefront during the 2011-12 academic year. The Owls posted a runner-up finish

for the Northeast-10 Conference Presidents' Cup – the highest mark since joining the league and third top-three finish in the last four years. In addition, the department finished No. 48 in the Learfield Sports Directors Cup, once again ranking in the top-20 percent of all Division II programs.

Seven programs were represented in NCAA Championships action, including a third-place finish – highest in program history – by the men's indoor track and field team and a run by the softball team to the College World Series. The women's basketball team also reached the second round of the NCAA Tournament.

Five programs won Northeast-10 Conference Championships during the year – men's indoor and outdoor track and field, men's and women's swimming and diving and softball (regular season).

On the individual front, the Owls produced three NCAA National Champions and two NCAA runner-up performances. A total of 20 student-athletes representing six different programs were named All-Americans.

The Owls also thrived in the classroom and in the community in 2011-12. SCSU student-athletes, coaches and staff members volunteered more than 3,000 hours of their time for numerous community service initiatives, including campus events such as Jail N Bail, Friends of Rudolph and The Big Event, as well as off-campus projects with numerous organizations.

Nicol also oversaw the continued facility improvements at Moore Field House and Pelz Gymnasium, and spearheaded the creation of a 'Fan Zone' store for SCSU athletics apparel and merchandise in the Michael J. Adanti Student Center.

The academic achievements of the Owls in 2011-12 continue to highlight the outstanding work through the combined efforts between student-athletes, coaches and administrators. SCSU student-athletes soared to new heights, as evidenced by nearly 325 selections to the Northeast-10 Conference Commissioner's Honor Roll and 36 Northeast-10 Conference All-Academic Team honorees. The department also had seven Academic All-Americans, 14 Academic All-District selections and one Northeast-10 Conference Scholar-Athlete Sport Excellence Award winner.

The department enjoyed one of the finest years in school history in 2010-11, including NCAA Championship participation from 10 programs for the second straight year. SCSU also finished No. 25 in the Learfield Sports Directors Cup, best among Northeast-10 Conference schools and the highest finish in school history. In addition, SCSU finished third out of 15 member institutions in the annual Northeast-10 Conference Presidents' Cup.

DIRECTOR OF ATHLETICS PATRICIA NICOL

The baseball team reached the College World Series and advanced to the national semifinals for the first time in school history, while the men's outdoor track and field program finished ninth at the NCAA Championships and won its first-ever New England Championship. The men's soccer team reached the NCAA second round, while the softball squad made it to the NCAA regional finals.

Eight programs won Northeast-10 Conference Championships during the year – men's indoor and outdoor track and field, men's and women's swimming and diving, women's indoor and outdoor track and field, baseball (regular season) and softball (tournament).

On the individual front, the Owls produced one NCAA National Champion and three NCAA runner-up performances. In addition, a total of 24 student-athletes representing eight different programs were named All-Americans.

SCSU student-athletes, coaches and staff members also volunteered more than 3,000 hours of their time for community service in 2010-11. Academically, the department had more than 350 selections to the Northeast-10 Conference Commissioner's Honor Roll and 30 Northeast-10 Conference All-Academic Team honorees – both the highest totals in school history. A pair of senior student-athletes – Logan Lentz and Jennifer Peterson – were also awarded the prestigious Henry Barnhard Award, given to just four students at SCSU and only a dozen across the entire CSU system annually.

Nicol also spearheaded facility improvements to both Moore Field House and Jess Dow Field, including a complete replacement of the artificial surface, during the 2010-11 academic year. She also oversaw the creation of an individual Community Service accolade awarded to one exceptional student-athlete each academic year.

The 2009-10 academic year featured NCAA Championship participation from 10 programs, highlighted by appearances from the men's soccer, baseball and softball teams. Seven programs won Northeast-10 Conference Championships during the year – football, men's indoor and outdoor track and field, women's swimming and diving, women's outdoor track and field, baseball (regular season) and softball (tournament). On the individual front, 22 student-athletes were named All-Americans.

The Owls continued to excel in the classroom and in the community as well in 2009-10. SCSU student-athletes, coaches and staff members volunteered more than 2,500 hours of their time for numerous community service initiatives.

Furthermore, the Owls had 300 selections to the Northeast-10 Conference Commissioner's Honor Roll. From the conference level, 18 student-athletes were also

named to the Northeast-10 Conference All-Academic Team, while three student-athletes were selected as winners of the league's inaugural Scholar-Athlete Sport Excellence Award. The department also had six Academic All-District selections, while senior gymnast Sarah Darst was named a First-Team Academic All-American.

The 2008-09 academic year featured 11 programs participating in NCAA post-season action, including appearances by the football, field hockey and softball teams. SCSU finished third out of 15 member institutions in the annual Northeast-10 Conference Presidents' Cup, matching the highest department finish since joining the league. In addition, the Owls also won four Northeast-10 Conference championships and 18 student-athletes earned All-America honors during the year.

In addition, Nicol has been instrumental in lending support and oversight to several key department projects.

The first phase of facility upgrades to Moore Field House was completed in late 2008. Improvements in phase one included several lobby upgrades – including new displays of the history of SCSU athletics, its 10 team National Championships, a new Athletic Hall of Fame display, as well as additional signage – as well as new team locker rooms and a new state-of-the-art Athletic Training room. The main gymnasium in Moore Field House now also houses banners for all athletic programs recognizing Northeast-10 Conference and NCAA Tournament success.

Additional initiatives spearheaded by Nicol include the launch of the Athletic Department Study Table and Tutorial programs, relaunch of the Faculty Athletic Advisory Board, creation of the annual Senior Athletic Awards banquet and implementation of the department's new website, www.southernctowls.com.

The Owls have also enjoyed an increased external affairs presence in the areas of marketing, promotions and corporate sponsorships with Nicol leading the department.

Nicol had been Southern's interim director since August, 2004, after serving as interim co-director since June, 2003. She is the fourth director of athletics in Southern history and the first female to be appointed to that position.

Prior to her interim appointment, Nicol served as associate director of athletics with the Owls' administration following three years as assistant director of athletics at the University of Maryland. Prior to that, Nicol spent six years as associate director of athletics at Providence College.

Nicol earned bachelor's (1980) and master's (1983) degrees from the University of Rhode Island, where she was an NCAA qualifier in track and field. Inducted into the URI Athletic Hall of Fame in 1990, she also served as head cross country/track coach at West Virginia University in 1983-84.

Nicol, a resident of Wallingford, Conn., has two children, Christine and Michael.

ATHLETIC ADMINISTRATION

BOE PEARMAN

Associate Director of Athletics/
Senior Woman Administrator



Now in her eighth year as associate director of athletics and senior woman administrator at Southern Connecticut State University, Belinda “Boe” Pearman possesses a background of more than 20 years in collegiate athletics as a student-athlete, coach and administrator, in addition to experience in professional sports

and the private sector.

Pearman is responsible for the department’s compliance with NCAA and conference rules and regulations, encompassing more than 500 student-athletes and 60 coaches. She also coordinates all rules education programs for coaches and staff, as well as initial and continuing eligibility for all student-athletes.

She also serves as the sport administrator for the men’s and women’s basketball, men’s and women’s swimming and diving and gymnastics programs. In this role, she supervises all aspects of the daily operations of the five squads.

She also serves as the department liaison with campus constituents including the Offices of Admissions, Financial Aid, Residence Life, the Registrar, Bursar and Institutional Advancement.

During her time at SCSU, Pearman has developed and implemented several new policies and procedures, including the Athletic Department Study Table and Tutorial programs. Academic success for Owls’ student-athletes continues to soar to an all-time high thanks to these initiatives. The department has had nearly 1,200 selections Northeast-10 Commissioners Honor Roll over the course of the past five years. In addition, more than 100 student-athletes were recognized at the conference level or higher for academic excellence within a specific sport in each of the past five years.

Pearman also serves as a member of the Student Athlete Advisory Board and serves on the planning committee for the Annual Owl Golf Classic. She has also served on the University’s Drug and Alcohol Task Force Committee. On the internal front, Pearman has also chaired several committees at SCSU.

She has also been active on the conference and regional levels, having served as the department representative on the Northeast-10 Conference’s Committee for Sports Administration. Pearman also completed a term on the NCAA Division II East Regional Women’s Basketball Committee.

Also a respected member of the coaching community, Pearman was the head women’s basketball coach at Rhode Island from 1999-2004 and guided the Rams to the Atlantic 10 Conference Championship game for only the second time in the history of the program. She also helped to reenergize the local community through extensive outreach and fundraising efforts and resulted in new benchmarks in annual giving and attendance.

In addition, Pearman’s teams had three consecutive winning seasons for only the second time in URI history.

Equally as impressive was the fact that all players that completed their eligibility under Pearman graduated during her stint with the Rams.

Pearman took over at URI after serving as the associate head coach with the New England Blizzard of the American Basketball League. In this role, she provided leadership in the pioneering effort to organize and conduct the first professional basketball league for women.

She joined the Blizzard after a successful stint as an assistant coach at the University of Maryland (1985-97). During her time at Maryland as both a student-athlete and coach, the Terps won six ACC championships and appeared in 12 NCAA tournaments with three Elite Eight berths and two Final Four berths.

Numerous individuals who once played for Pearman have since moved on into the college coaching ranks at institutions in several notable Division I conferences, including the Atlantic Coast Conference, Big East Conference, West Coast Conference, Atlantic-10 Conference and Northeast Conference.

A four-year starter and Second Team All-Atlantic Coast Conference player at the University of Maryland from 1980-84, Pearman earned a bachelor’s degree from UM.

Pearman, who also has amassed experience in the private sector as a community consultant, currently resides in Cheshire, Conn.

MICHAEL KOBYLANSKI

Associate Director of Athletics/
Communications



Veteran athletic administrator Michael Kobylanski joined the Owls' staff in July, 2007 and is in his sixth year as Associate Director of Athletics/Communications.

He oversees all internal and external communications efforts for the SCSU Athletic Department and its 19 varsity sports, including media relations, publications, marketing, promotions, community

relations and corporate sponsorship. He also serves as the sport administrator for the Owls' baseball, field hockey and women's lacrosse programs, as well as the department's NCAACHAMPS/Life Skills Coordinator. In total, Kobylanski has amassed more than a decade's worth of experience within the field of collegiate athletic administration.

Kobylanski's first five years at SCSU have been highlighted by the formation of numerous key initiatives, including the relaunch of a renamed athletic department website - www.southernctowls.com, implementation of the Community Service Cup and National Student-Athlete Day event and the creation of comprehensive marketing and promotional schedules for all athletic programs.

Dale, a resident and native of Meriden, Conn., also previously served as a student assistant athletic trainer at both SCSU and Branford (Conn.) High School.



Southern Connecticut State University maintains an outstanding intercollegiate athletic program for men and women, recognizing the needs of students in individual and team sports. The Owls are members of the Northeast-10 Conference, the Eastern College Athletic Conference (ECAC) and the National Collegiate Athletic Association (NCAA) Division II. Southern's women's gymnastics program also participates in the USA Gymnastics collegiate championships.

Southern has had numerous individual NCAA champions in swimming, track and field and gymnastics and ranks among the top 10 of Division II colleges and universities for most individual championships. In addition, the Owls have won a NCAA Division II record six NCAA team titles in men's soccer, three in men's gymnastics and one in women's basketball.

Women's programs in cross country, field hockey, volleyball, soccer, swimming, gymnastics, basketball, track and field (indoor & outdoor), lacrosse and softball have produced many distinguished athletes and coaches. Southern has a rich tradition in women's basketball, having placed among the top four teams nationally four times. The Owls' Mary Anne O'Connor and Sue Rojcewicz were members of the 1976 U.S. Olympic women's basketball team, which won a silver medal at Montreal. The 2007 team won the Division II National Championship for the first time in program history while finishing the year 34-2 overall.


Men's programs include soccer, cross country, football, track and field (indoor & outdoor), swimming, basketball and baseball. The Owls' Ben Michaelson, a 10-time NCAA champion in swimming, won two gold medals and set two records in 2003 for the United States at the Pan American Games. Peter Kormann, who coached U.S. Olympic teams at Atlanta in 1996 and in Sydney in 2000, became the first U.S. gymnast in 44 years to win an Olympic medal when he captured a bronze medal in floor exercise at the 1976 Montreal Olympic Games. Owls' gymnastics coach emeritus Abie Grossfeld coached the U.S. Olympic team in 1972, 1984 and 1988, leading his team to a team gold medal in 1984.

Among Southern alumni in professional sports, Joe Andruzzi recently retired after a 10-year career with the New England Patriots, Green Bay Packers and Cleveland Browns of the National Football League. Andruzzi was a part of three Super Bowl winning clubs with the Patriots. Currently, Jacques Cesaire is a defensive lineman with the San Diego Chargers.

The Owls also have a strong presence in the National Football League coaching ranks. Kevin Gilbride currently serves as offensive coordinator for the Super Bowl champion New York Giants. He was also the head coach for the San Diego Chargers during a NFL coaching career that has spanned more than 20 years. Chris Palmer is the current offensive coordinator for the Tennessee Titans. He was the quarterbacks coach for the Giants during their Super Bowl XLII victory and has also been the head coach of the Cleveland Browns during a NFL coaching career of more than two decades. Tim Holt is in his first year as offensive line coach for the Chicago Bears after three years on the staff of the Tampa Bay Buccaneers.

Bo Oshoniyi, currently an assistant men's soccer coach at Penn State University, retired from Major League Soccer after suiting up with the Columbus Crew and Kansas City Wizards. Fellow men's soccer alum Brian Bliss played for three teams in MLS and also served as head coach of Kansas City. He is currently the Technical Director with Columbus. Two-time Major League Soccer All-Star Mike Petke retired from the MLS with the New York Red Bulls in 2010. Former Owl Juan Carlos Osorio is a past head coach of Red Bull New York.

The Owls have enjoyed a strong alumni presence in the college basketball coaching community. Joan Bonvicini is the head coach at Seattle University and has also served as head coach at the University of Arizona and Long Beach State University in a distinguished career with more than 600 victories. Cathy Inglese is the head coach at the University of Rhode Island after previous stops at Boston College and the University of Vermont. She has totaled more than 400 victories in her coaching career. Don Perrelli, a former SCSU men's basketball standout, won more than 400 games as a college women's basketball coach with stops at SCSU, St. John's and Northwestern University.



Dedicated in November of 1988, Jess Dow Field is a multi-million dollar stadium facility which can accommodate football, soccer, field hockey, lacrosse and track and field. The AstroPlay artificially-surfaced playing field is surrounded by an eight-lane, state-of-the-art 400-meter track surface, both of which were replaced in 2000. Directly adjacent to Southern's Moore Field House, Dow Field is lighted and has seating for some 6,000. The facility was completely resurfaced in the summer, 2011.

James W. Moore Field House is Southern's primary indoor athletic complex. The main arena, with a permanent seating capacity of 2,800, has a six-lane, artificially-surfaced track (200 meters), which was completely renovated in the summer of 1997. The fieldhouse is utilized for all major indoor events and can accommodate multiple practice sessions simultaneously. Drop curtains and netting allow the main arena to accommodate a complete baseball or softball infield for practice as well as the traditional indoor programs.

Moore Field House also has complete weight-training facilities, locker rooms and equipment rooms. Located in Moore Fieldhouse, Hutchinson Natatorium has an eight-lane swimming pool with both one- and three-meter diving boards and a Colorado timing system.

The recently renovated Pelz Gymnasium is the oldest of the Southern athletic facilities and is utilized primarily for physical education classes, recreation & intramurals, women's gymnastics, and volleyball. The facility has a six-lane pool and an independent, auxiliary gymnasium for gymnastics.

The Owls also recently refurbished their softball facility behind Pelz Gym and opened a new baseball complex in the fall of 2001.

All of the Southern facilities have played host to collegiate and scholastic championship events.
